Face Toward Jerusalem

As we journey through Lent, toward Palm Sunday, Holy Week, and Easter, I remember how Jesus had his face set toward Jerusalem. He told his disciples about how he was going to Jerusalem. "He took his disciples aside," it is written in the gospel of Matthew, "and said to them, '*We are going up to Jerusalem, and the Son of Man will be betrayed to the chief priests and the teachers of the law. They will condemn him to death and will turn him over to the Gentiles to be mocked and flogged and crucified. On the third day he will be raised to life!*'" (Matthew 20:17-19)

People argue over whether or not Jesus had a choice about this. I believe that Jesus did have a choice and yet, he chose to do the only thing he could choose to do, given his nature. He chose to fulfill his purpose. He needed to give, to give of himself for the sake of others, for the sake of God's will, for the sake of our salvation.

We all face such choices. Some of us choose early in our lives to pursue a course that we are certain is intended for us. Others of us are less sure and take a longer time to figure out our course. Some of us change our life focus, a second career, our personal relationships, etc. Others of us miss the chance to accept an opportunity given to us because we are unsure, fear the risk, and want a more secure path. And in some cases, circumstances beyond our control change, forcing us to change.

I admire those who, like Jesus, choose a course for the sake of others, like those who enlist into the military to serve the cause of freedom knowing that it may cost their lives. They set their face, women and men, to submit to the demanding training of following orders that they do not understand for a cause they may or may not agree with. They choose to set their face to obey and trust the orders of others without question knowing that it

is likely that they will suffer and perhaps die.

What are you facing? Some of us face things that we have not chosen: a chronic and/or terminal illness, unemployment, financial debt, addictions, divorce, estrangement from family and friends, the loss of a close family member and/or friend.

Nations, like Haiti and Chile, face the ravages of earthquakes. Nations like Iraq and Afghanistan face the horrors of war. Such nations have no choice but to face these things.

"What is the Main Thing?"

I would like you to think with me about what you are facing and the choices you make. As a disciple of Jesus are you making choices that you feel are consistent with the person God has called you to be, created you to be and become? The choices that Jesus usually asks us to make are not easy ones. They are usually consistent with his statements like this from Luke 14: "*Suppose one of you wants to build a tower. Will he not first sit down and estimate the cost to see if he has enough money to complete it? For if he lays the foundation and is not able to finish it, everyone who sees it will ridicule him, saying, 'This fellow began to build and was not able to finish.'*" (vv. 28-30)

In 2004 I decided to build a new house, but first I had to demolish the old one and start all over. I thought about trying to update the old one but the thought of doing so would have produced a disappointing result at best, like trying to put new wine into old wine skins.

So, I decided to pursue the more challenging road: tear the whole thing down and build a new house, a lot more expensive and a lot more work. It was a risk because I wasn't sure I could find financing for it. I also knew that if I was going to build a new house I wanted to build it the way my father, grandfather, and uncle had taught, to build it strong, with high quality labor and materials, again, the more costly route. If I was going to be true to myself, I had to do my best to do it the way that was given to me. Fortunately, I found a contractor and skilled craftspeople who were of like mind.

Over the course of the project I realized that if I was going to fulfill my goal of building the house the way I wanted, I needed an additional amount of money. A friend of mine realized my dilemma and quietly loaned me the additional money. I completely fulfilled my goal! The house was fully built the way I wanted and exceeded my expectations! I eventually paid my friend back.

If I had chosen an easier course of action I would have regretted what was probably for me the only opportunity in my life to build the house of my dreams. Building that house was a parable of my life, to do the best job I can for every opportunity God gives to me, to never take the easier road, but the best road, the road consistent with who I am, who God created me to be, and who Jesus Christ has challenged me to be.

I set my face to build a house. I never looked back. I trusted God to help me and God sent to me the best builders and the best friends. If I had not chosen the path that I did, I would never have discovered what God had in store for me. The

challenge not only yielded a house, but a dream fulfilled, friends made, growth in me, and an accomplishment that my late father would have been extremely proud of (this, alone, was reward enough).

Jesus invites us to walk with him to Jerusalem this Lent. Can we make the harder, more costly choice, knowing the cost? Can we be the people who God created us to be, who Jesus Christ invites us to be? I know, it's not easy, but you can do it. What is God asking you to face?
