Easter: New Life and Sacrifice

Jesus made an offering to us to bring us to Easter. He offered nothing less than himself, his whole self. He offered himself unto death so that we might live now and into the future. He offered himself so that we might live beyond our challenges, beyond our losses, beyond our sufferings, beyond our sorrows, and beyond our sin. We live because he lives. As a result, we are confident that the challenges of death, sin, and suffering will not have the last word, but that God, through Jesus Christ, will speak and give us new life, new hope, allowing our journey of faith to continue forever.

When I was a child and I broke something, my parents paid to have it repaired or replaced. If I broke something in the house, like a lamp, my parents said, "That's okay. We know you didn't mean to do it. Don't worry. We'll take care of it." They did.

As I grew, they taught me how to take care of things so that they didn't break. My father, a farmer and carpenter, taught me how to take care of the tools so that they lasted. Tools were too expensive to be replaced frequently.

More importantly, they taught me how to take care of life, the lives of the animals on the farm. It wasn't just that they were expensive, but that they were living, breathing gifts of God's creation. I was taught to treat them with respect and loving care. As I grew older and able to understand, my parents gave me responsibility over the lives of the animals. Their well-being depended upon what I did, feeding them, protecting them, cleaning up after them.

I learned that with responsibility for tools and life came consequences. If I followed their direction, all usually went well. If I did not, then, things and life would suffer. My family would suffer and I would suffer. If I did something wrong I was given a chance to correct my mistake(s). I was also punished if they felt I knew better, and if I intentionally did something to damage a tool, to harm an animal.

My parents taught me that my actions had consequences, and affected the lives and well-being of others. I live with those lessons every day and think about them when acting and making decisions. They are no longer here to sacrifice and pay for my accidents, mistakes, and sins. Now I must be the one who pays and sacrifices for what I do.

On a Thursday in Jerusalem Jesus gathered around a table with his disciples in an upper room, sharing what we call the "Last Supper," his last meal before his arrest, trial, flogging, and crucifixion on the following day, Friday. He paid for our sins, taking responsibility for them through the sacrifice of his life. He gave us a great gift, the gift of forgiveness, and, therefore the gift of salvation, saving us from total

destruction, eternal death. He saved us from forgetting how to honor life with respect and dignity, the lives of others and our own.

But on the following Sunday, Jesus showed us that his sacrifice brought a great and grand reward: Resurrection! Alleluia! He is Risen! Death, sin, evil, and destruction do not have the last word!!!

Yes, my parents sacrificed and suffered for me. They frequently helped me out of the mistakes of my own doing so that I could go on living, growing, maturing, and finding life and a future. On one such occasion when I had an automobile accident that was clearly my fault, my mother hired and paid for an attorney to represent me in court. She suffered as a result of what I did and paid the price, for my sake. I got through it as a result of what she did, learning a valuable lesson about responsibility and consequences. Someone had to pay for what I did. My mother did that for me. Why? She loved me and wanted a happy, successful, and healthy future for me. And Jesus Christ has done the same for us, because he, too, loves us so much!!! He has staked his life upon it and wishes for us to experience fulfillment and meaning in our lives.

Jesus told his disciples in the Upper Room at the Last Supper to remember him. Remembering him allows us to remember his life, teaching, and purpose. He has given us that meaning, lasting meaning, and eternal life.

I remember Jesus and I remember my parents, how their sacrifices have given me such a grand and wonderful life of meaning and purpose. Now I am the one who can do what they did, sacrifice for the sake of the lives of others, through my living, acting, forgiving, teaching, preaching, and giving. I now understand that my sacrifice can give the same to others as I have been given, food for eating and living, hope in the midst of despair, the company of friendship wherever it takes us, and the knowledge that my Savior, Jesus Christ, can be your Savior, too. My sorrows, losses, and sins, have not had the last word in my life. As a result, I am here with you today. Jesus Christ has delivered me and he can deliver you.

Therefore, I extend to you an invitation to join with me in the journey of faith, getting to know a man named Jesus. Be prepared to follow the example of others, like my parents, like Jesus, to sacrifice knowing that whatever we give and do, in the name of God, will be honored by God to serve a great purpose, the purpose of new life for others, and, truth be known, for us, also.

My parents died knowing that what they did for my brother and I resulted in our happiness and fulfilled lives. Jesus died and rose knowing that his gift of life allows me to lose my self in order to find my new self by living as he did, giving myself for the sake of others. I have learned that one person can make a difference. But oh, the mountains that we can move for the sake of God's work when we work together, as a team, as disciples!

Alleluia! Christ is Risen!


Engraved Brick Patio
